Artificial Intelligence (AI) and Language Acquisition; Benefits and Challenges

In a globalized society, learning a language is a crucial ability because most employers today favor people who can speak one or more foreign languages. Despite the abundance of language materials and tools, user engagement appears to be declining as a result of users' frequent feelings of overwhelm and lack of will to continue their studies.

Nonetheless, there is hope owing to artificial intelligence being implemented into language learning apps to boost participation. Presently, thanks to the entry of AI into the educational sector, the majority of educational apps use language learning to make studying more enjoyable and effective.

This article will first look at the problems and challenges which language learners are facing these days while they are in the long-lasting process of acquiring a new language. Then it will briefly examine the advantages of using AI in language learning as well as the potential problems situations they may bring about for the learners.

Challenges of Learning a New Language

This inner voice runs counter to the notion that one may push themselves beyond their comfort zones. The mentioned obstacles seem to be less effective by the development of new generation of language learning systems powered by AI (Artificial Intelligence). 






CYBERSECURITY

Cybersecurity at sea. The concept of cybersecurity is widely known and discussed.

This time, however, let's look at what it looks like from the point of view of seagoing ships. Ships and maritime infrastructure are highly dependent on digital technologies. Information exchange, control, performance assurance and much more make a seagoing ship vulnerable to all kinds of cyberattacks. A well-known example is jamming radar signals by spoofing or misleading ship captains with false AIS messages. 80% of the world's transport is carried out by sea. A major cyberattack could therefore disrupt a huge supply chain, with incalculable consequences even for the economies of entire countries. The International Maritime Organization is aware of this fact and takes various actions. New legal solutions are implemented and training is conducted. Cybersecurity at sea means efficient and safe transport. Increasing awareness in this area is a natural consequence of the current times and must not be underestimated. Continuous and repeatable training is particularly important. Sea transport is a job in an international environment where people from different countries, different cultures, different mentalities, etc. meet. Awareness of vulnerability to cyberattacks varies here - from ignorance to specialist knowledge in the field of IT. It is also important to remember, as research shows, that the risk of a cyberattack cannot be eliminated. However, it is necessary to work on ensuring that possible effects are possible to eliminate at the highest level.

The return of ITB was heralded by UNWTO as proof of strong confidence in travel as "the ultimate barometer of trust". UNWTO Secretary-General Zurab Pololikashvili was invited to officially open the event, alongside Germany's Vice-Chancellor Robert Habeck, Georgian Prime Minister Irakli Garibashvili, Berlin Mayor Franziska Giffey, and public and private sector leaders. ITB Berlin is the world's biggest tourism and travel trade fair. last week's event was the first in-person ITB for four years and comes as the sector's recovery is well underway. According to UNWTO, international tourism could reach 80 to 95% of pre-pandemic numbers by the end of the year, with 70 million international arrivals recorded in January alone (more than double the number of January 2022). for more information visit this link. At the official ITB opening, UNWTO reinforced the importance of education, training, and investments for tourism's ability to deliver on its potential. In Berlin, UNWTO announced a new partnership that will see the Organization Work with Saudi Arabia to promote education and professional development in tourism. The key message of investing in people was also stressed as UNWTO took part in a special Industry Roundtable. The event built on UNWTO's status as the bridge between the public and private sectors. Recognizing the vital need for more and better-targeted investments to put transformative plans into action, UNWTO also confirmed that World Tourism Day 2023 will be celebrated around the theme of "Tourism and Green Investments". UNWTO returned to ITB Berlin with a clear message: Tourism is back and committed to delivering positive change that goes beyond the sector itself.

MBA THESIS / RESEARCH PROPOSAL

I have been asked by my master's students to guide them on how to start their master's thesis, and I am pleased to share with them the way to start their thesis in a simple way. Students need to start with a research proposal, which is a rough idea of their thesis' content. The rough idea is important in terms of letting them and their supervisors know what and how they will write their final thesis, and it is very important to discover any mistakes in the first place before starting to write the final thesis. The research proposal should include the following key parts of your research:

1. Think about your topic. A topic is a must because it forms the main idea of your work. Students are suggested to carefully choose a topic that is too narrow because it is considered a subject matter and will let students find any information and literature easily. If you are not able to find the topic, try to get advice from your supervisor or any professor in the same field.

2. *Write a short introduction*. The introduction part is a way to let your supervisor know

precisely about all the details of your work. In the introduction, you should spell it out to focus on different aspects of your thesis, starting from why you have selected the topic, the way you will investigate your case, the way you will collect your literature, how to justify your research methodology, how you will come up with the hypothesis for your research paper, and finally the way you will analyze data.

3. A typical literature review. You should prove your skill by demonstrating how to use a literature review in your proposal and how to include a critical evaluation of the material. Through this skill, you will prove to your supervisors your capability to use a variety of academic or scholarly sources that are relevant, current, and authoritative such as books, journal articles, reports, government documents, conference proceedings, and web resources.

4. *Research Methodology.* It is important to show your supervisors the methods you will use to analyze your data. Also, try to use more than one method, e.g., quantitative and qualitative, rather than one method. Importantly, the selected method must align with your topic, so if your supervisor sees that the method does not suit the topic, he or she can advise you to change it before you start with your thesis.

5. An effective conclusion. The last part of your proposal should summarize the results in the conclusion section. It will show your supervisors your ability to persuasively and succinctly restate your research problem. Also, include a small section to reflect the evidence presented in the literature review and your ability to link it with your findings. Finally, try to include a small paragraph to let your supervisors understand why your research should matter to BSBI.

Winter in northern Europe is steel grey with sharp edges and a metallic aftertaste as Olga Tokarczuk Nobel laureate in literature, wrote - and shows that the earth is not a friendly place for people. We can feel tired and depressed. Is the art and culture the answer to that? While creative activities such as the visual arts, music and choir participation have been used for some time to treat or manage mental ill-health in the clinical context (McCrary et al., 2022), a growing body of literature suggests that arts and culture activities, such as going to a concert, theatre show, cinema, or visiting a museum or exhibition, can enhance and protect mental health and wellbeing in the general population setting. Creating art can help to reduce stress levels and promote relaxation. It can be a great way to unwind after a long day and let go of any tension or anxiety. Participating in art boost creativity and encourages new ways of thinking. This can be beneficial not just for artistic endeavors, but also for problem-solving in other areas of life. Making art can be a great way to boost mood and increase feelings of happiness and wellbeing. This can be especially true if the artmaking process is enjoyable and engaging. Engaging in creative activities can help to enhance cognitive function and improve brain health. This can be particularly beneficial for older adults, as it may help to

stave off age-related cognitive decline.

What is already known about this subject? The existing literature indicates that engaging in arts and culture activities such as attending concerts, shows, movies, visiting museums or exhibitions can have a positive impact on mental health and wellbeing. Studies conducted in England and Norway have shown that these activities can help prevent depression in the general population. Despite global evidence supporting the potential benefits of arts and culture activities on mental health, the involvement of cultural and creative sectors in health strategies is still important. Encouraging the public to participate in such activities at least once every quarter can be an effective mental health promotion initiativE.

Rebellious Berlin: Thoughts on Freedom and *Democracy.* Berlin is a city full of revolutionary stories. In March, there are special programs to follow the traces of March revolution 1848. For those of us entering Berlin as newcomers, looking at new buildings, historical sites, however what we are missing are the stories behind each street and facade giving extensive knowledge about how history is shaping life today in Berlin. Berlin's turbulent history comes to life on the banks of the Spree. 175 years ago, in March 1848, Berliners fought for democratic liberties, a constitution and the unification of Germany. On November 9, 1918, the Kaiser was overthrown in Berlin and the Republic was proclaimed. In 1968 the student movement was at its peak. Other rebellious events such as the GDR civil rights movement of 1989 are also presented on the journeys prepared for visitors. Women also made a political appearance in Berlin in 1848, they took part in barricade fights, helped the wounded, wrote appeals and petitions. They founded women's associations, published magazines, and went beyond the critical writing of bourgeois women before March. Some died during the fighting. others were spied on, expelled, and forced into exile. These programs and tours are for all of us to remember the road to democracy and wellbeing of a society is a continues process. To remember the barricade fighters who lost their lives for freedom, democracy, and a better life 175 years ago. There are speakers including the President of the Bundestag Bärbel Bas, MdB,

President of the House of Representatives Dennis Buchner, MdA, the human rights activist Düzen Tekkal and Volker Schröder, Action 18 March. These programs are funded by the Berlin State Center for Civil Education for children, tourists, students, (barrier-free) participants and all who beyond enjoying their lives in freedom, engage in an interaction with the society to fulfil their roles as citizens of the world.

EMOTIONS

The Universality of Emotion Expressions. We all experience diverse emotions throughout the whole day and we express them overtly in the process of interpersonal communication. As to the cultural specifics of emotion facial expressions, Dr. Paul Ekman discovered strong evidence of universality of some facial expressions of emotions. When Dr Ekman began researching facial expressions of emotions across cultures (1972, 1975), he initially had the opposite view to Charles Darwin. Ekman believed that expressions were socially learned, and therefore culturally variable. Dr. Ekman's initial study consisted of showing these groups of people photographs of individuals displaying different facial expressions of emotion. He would then ask the groups to judge what emotion they thought was being displayed in each photograph. The vast majority of the individuals from the five cultures agreed on the expressed emotion. While this was a big step towards Darwin's universality view that expressions of emotion are universal, Ekman was not fully convinced. So, to test this theory, Ekman came up with a solution: to go to a faraway place completely isolated from the rest of the world with no TV shows nor popular magazines to see how people display basic emotions. Consequently, in Ekman's experiment, a man living in New Guinea was asked to display facial expressions according to some described situations and the facial expressions of his on some basic emotions match those of other European cultures. This fact drove Ekman to the conclusion that especially basic emotions are of universal nature.
